

THE SEA REFLECTED IN THE MOSAIC FLOORS OF THE ROMAN EMPIRE: IT'S ROLE IN CULTURAL INTERACTION

28TH FEB., 1ST, 2ND MAR. 2025. LAGOS (PORTUGAL)

East meets West. Investigating the reciprocal influence of East and West in the Roman geometric mosaics of Portugal and Türkiye. A comparative study.


The RoGeMoPorTur project (Roman Geometric Mosaics in Portugal and Türkiye) is, in essence, a pilot project of scientific cooperation between researchers in the fields of archaeology and art history of Portugal and Türkiye in the area of Roman mosaics.

Aiming to identify and analyse the appearance, evolution and construction of Roman mosaics in Portuguese and Turkish territory, it identifies - whenever possible - the exchange and cultural interaction between East and West resulting - among other factors - on the mobility of craftsmen, of trade, on the existing contacts between different parts of the Empire.

A multi-annual project that, in a first stage, which has currently been taking place, will lead to the elaboration of inventories of Roman mosaics both in Portugal and Türkiye: The inclusion of this information on mosaics in general and the evaluation of mosaics with geometric patterns in a systematic corpus will be of extreme advantage for the understanding of the evolution of mosaics with geometric patterns of the East and of the Roman Empire's Western end. In order to achieve this the study of the floors of selected archaeological sites and the analysis of recurring motifs in the mosaic floors of both areas have been developed.

As progress is made, the results of the studies carried out are presented at international conferences, colloquia and published in most cases in open access, making them accessible to both the scientific community and an interested public.

In a final stage, the discussion of the results and the preparation of the publication both of the Inventory as of the final comparative study will take place.



The 1st International Colloquium RoGeMoPorTur was held in Alter-do-Chão from the 1st of July till the 3rd of July 2016 as part of the work plan of the Portuguese - Turkish team. The 2nd International Colloquium RoGeMoPorTur will be held in Lagos (Portugal), from the 28th of February to the 2nd of March.

The theme of the 2nd Colloquium of the RoGeMoPorTur Project

"The sea reflected in the mosaic floors of the Roman Empire: it's role in cultural interaction"


One of the most defining aspects of the cultural richness of the Western world is undoubtedly the existence and mutual influence of different cultures, coming together and intertwining in a continuous evolution. Contacts between people from different cultures and regions have always been a reality, giving rise to new cultural expressions in a symbiosis between the existing and the new. Politics and trade, territorial expansion and the settlement of conquered lands, among other things, were factors in the cultural and artistic exchange between the different regions of the Roman Empire. This exchange is well represented and present in the numerous testimonies of our Hellenistic and Roman heritage.

The sea (Mare Nostrum and the Atlantic Ocean) has played a decisive role as a tool for the diffusion of cultures: Anatolian, Greek, Italian, Phoenician, Celtic, Iberian, Punic, Egyptian and North African civilizations have interacted and influenced each other by sea for centuries.

In the 2nd RoGeMoPorTur Colloquium mosaics with a maritime theme from different parts of the Mediterranean will be presented.

The importance of the presence of marine themes both on the coast and in direct connection with local economic activity, the mythology of the sea, the miscegenation of cultures expressed in the interpretations of the same theme in different regions of the Roman Empire are some of the aspects to addressed in this Colloquium.

Recent discoveries and comparative critical analyses of pavements known and studied in the past will also be addressed: they can eventually lead to new interpretations and establish new paradigms of knowledge.
